ing and cabinetry shop in the store, E.J. Grant Antiques can restore or adapt almost any piece.)



square-foot shop uses every available surface for the overflowing selection—paintings cover the walls, hutches hold stacks of pottery and glassware, and tables display vast arrangements of accessories. Most pieces are European 18th-and 19th-century furniture, but pieces from more than two dozen countries are represented. \square
